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
BUILDING CHARACTER, SHAPING FUTURES

CHARACTER UNDER THE SPOTLIGHT

In this edition we are shining the spotlight on a department within QET to further communicate the fantastic work being done to embed character within the Trust. This is a starting point for us to show a professional curiosity into each other's practices, celebrating and developing our own as we go.

In this edition Anna Brown, Teacher of PE and subject Character Education lead, gives an insight into the vast work the PE department at Haygrove do in regards to Character Education. Head of PE, Jim Gray created this role to promote specific attention and commitment to the area.



"Delving deeper into what Character Education truly is has helped me realise that PE is a fantastic vehicle for delivering it within our curriculum. There is a set of common

themes and values which supplement and complement each other. We are able to implicitly and explicitly embed character into our learning objectives, schemes of work and curriculum plans. The wider department focus is our use of our character terms within our AFL strategies. Students are asked to reflect both individually or with their peers about what to improve, change or challenge themselves to do whilst also celebrating and sharing successes. They're encouraged to be curious in trying new activities, tactics and exercises as we differentiate via task, activity or outcome. At both school clubs and in lessons, they will always be respectful to umpire calls and one another. Students will be responsible for their equipment, their spaces and their kit. In all that we do, we encourage students to be confident in the aforementioned points and to show compassion and support when their peers are faced with a challenge. In whatever our students do, in lesson, in the classroom or at extra curricular – their creativity and honesty is always admirable."

CHARACTER UNDER INSPECTION

To conclude this edition Helen Cullen, Head at Sexey's, provides us with an insight into what their most recent Ofsted and SIAMS Inspections said about Sexey's approach and inclusion of Character Education.

"These core values are lived daily in our thoughts, actions and words and it is these values that are the building blocks for the development of character in members of Sexey's School community.



We were delighted that when Ofsted visited in January 2023 they celebrated character development at Sexey's including how it is an integral thread of the school, that is well mapped and celebrated through the curriculum and character pathways.

Students and staff could share with both Ofsted Inspectors (January '23) and SIAMS Inspectors (November '22) the school approach to character development, the value of it and how it helps to create the ethos of our school. Without doubt character development is an integral part of life at Sexey's and one we are very proud of."
